Mr. Musk has caused quite a stir with his tweets over the past few years and these are some high(low)lights. But what to do with them? Well the clever hunter will notice that some of these reflect some companies on the packet of 'Internet Interest Graphs' in their Brown Bag and those time stamps seem to correspond with them. And hey, don't those graphs look a little funny? With some guidance from the angles of the tweets, handy folds, and shifts in perspective the hunters will
 find that the graphs make a shape:

A troll and gruff quotes? Following the HWOW will tell the hunters to "Run across before you get gobbled up" so run you shall, over to the bridge and safety!


If you are unable to locate Clue B, open emergency envelope 7, which will direct you to Clue C.

This is Clue B. Solving this clue will lead you to Clue C.

If you are unable to solve this clue, or to find Clue C, open emergency envelope 7, which will direct you to Clue C.

## This is emergency solution 7 , which will lead you to Clue $\mathbf{C}$.

When the Hunters grab the paper clue, they see five lines that appear as separate equations. Each line has multiple "double letter combinations" separated by pictures of Covid-19 Home Test plastic modules that act as mathematical operators. Since a Covid Home Test with a visible stripe below the " C " mark and also below the " T " mark indicates a test is positive, the mathematical operator showing both stripes is "+". A Covid Home Test with a visible stripe below the " $C$ " mark but no stripe below the " $T$ " mark indicates a test is negative, the operator showing just one stripe is "-".

Using the HWOW hint of " $A=1$ and $C F=36$," the Hunter knows that $A=1, B=2, C=3$....up to $H=8$. Solving each equation totals " 21 " which separated into the two numbers and back calculating equals the answer "BA" Given that there are five identical answers with BA, the hunter arrives at the answer BA. 5 (which is the pervasive Covid variant in 2022).


If you are unable to locate Clue C, open emergency envelope 17, which will direct you to Clue D.

## This is Clue C. Solving this clue will lead you to Clue D.

Hunters are presented with a grid board and several wires of varying lengths. The grid board has wire jacks at seemingly random points on the board and there is a button and a small display screen on the side of the board. Some of the jacks have numbers and others have a pin. There is a sign that reads, "Don't cross the streams."


If you are unable to solve this clue, or to find Clue D, open emergency envelope 17, which will direct you to Clue D.

This is emergency solution 17, which will lead you to Clue D.

Clever hunters will realize this is an electronic version of the game Herugolf and will arrange the wires so none of them cross.

Once they press the button, the display will show the royal cypher for newly minted King Charles III.


If you are unable to locate Clue D, open emergency envelope 24, which will direct you to Clue E.

## This is Clue D. Solving this clue will lead you to Clue E.

Hunters approach a table set up with 3 chairs and dinner plates: each plate has a full helping of pasta, but the western-most plate is filled with spaghetti. There are three chairs, two plastic and one wood - on the east side.


If you are unable to solve this clue, or to find Clue E, open emergency envelope 24, which will direct you to Clue E.

This is emergency solution 24, which will lead you to Clue E.

The astute hunter will notice that the table lines up with the cardinal directions quite well-and that there are two plastic chairs and one wooden chair. That wooden chair is on the east side of the table... East-Wood. And after reading about how "bad" spaghetti is from the article in the brown bag, they will notice that plate-full on the west side of the table. Keeping in mind the HWOW video, the hunters will remember the famous "Spaghetti Western" with Clint Eastwood:
The Good, The Bad, and the... UGLY)

If you are unable to locate Clue E , open emergency envelope 22, which will direct you to Clue F.

## This is Clue E. Solving this clue will lead you to Clue F.

This clue site consists of a cork board with various notable people connected with red string and a note asking, "What is the final destination?"


If you are unable to solve this clue, or to find Clue F, open emergency envelope 22, which will direct you to Clue $F$.

## This is emergency solution 22, which will lead you to Clue F.

After some investigation, a smart hunter will have figured out that the suspects shown on the canvas are all named James, and they have created quite a web of crimes. To solve this "James Webb" you need to go to its final destination, Lagrange Point 2. Head over to L2 for your next clue.


If you are unable to locate Clue $F$, open emergency envelope 18, which will direct you to Clue G.

This is Clue F. Solving this clue will lead you to Clue G.
At the site are two aquariums, side by side, with equal amounts of water inside. They each have three weights which are inside the aquariums when they arrive. All six weights are different sizes and shapes.


If you are unable to solve this clue, or to find Clue G, open emergency envelope 18 , which will direct you to Clue G.

This is emergency solution 18, which will lead you to Clue G.
Using instructions on the tables, Hunters must do a bit of math to find that the Upper Basin is now at $97 \%$ of its original level, and the Lower Basin is now at $92 \%$ of the Upper Basin (or 11\% lower than original). Using the marking on the aquariums as a guide, Hunters have to adjust the water levels by removing weights from the basins. With some trial and error, Hunters will find that the answer is:

This is a visual clue consisting of five marked exhibits at a campsite:

A clever detective will note that there are 5 blanks corresponding to 5 letters in the missing hiker's name, and that those blanks correlate to either a shape or a color in the campsite.
$J$ (First position): the rectangular shape of the box of matches on the wife's note
A (Second position): a green coat draped over the second chair in a line of five chairs
I (Third position): Red, there are 5 shoes, with one red heel in the third position
$M$ (Fourth position): the triangle on the map is in the fourth position and is the only symbol that correlates to the prompt

E (Fifth position): The camp notice is in a light blue diamond shape and says the word "last".
Head on over to:


If you are unable to locate Clue H , open emergency envelope 11, which will direct you to Clue I.

This isn't a math problem... but just a few primes? A clever hunter will remember that one must scan for prime access, but what to scan? Looking through the Brown Bag we find the ubiquitous QR code labeled Hunter's Daily QRossword. Scanning this leads the hunter to a password protected site - a password discovered by using the answers to the listed prime numbers!

If you are unable to locate Clue I, open emergency envelope 10, which will direct you to Clue J.

## This is Clue I. Solving this clue will lead you to Clue J.

Hunters approach a box that is raised to about 5 ft . off the ground. On each side of the box is a viewing window large enough for just one set of eyes. The view from each window reveals something different, but each has a set of instructions and a puzzle.


> If you are unable to solve this clue, or to find Clue J, open emergency envelope 10, which will direct you to Clue J.

## This is emergency solution 10 , which will lead you to Clue J.

To defuse this bomb, the hunters must figure out the secret code and head to the next location on the map! Hunters will realize that this puzzle cannot be solved alone by that one domineering teammate, but instead, they must use teamwork! If the hunters work together they will see that they each have the instructions to one of their fellow hunter's puzzles. Solving them together yields:

> Puzzle A: Red
> Puzzle B: 3
> Puzzle C: 147
> Puzzle D: 6

If they read the HWOW closely, the hunters will know that if the wire is red, we multiply!

This clue presents hunters with various photos of elite pilots from the Top Gun: Maverick movie, the eagerly awaited blockbuster sequel of the 1986 Top Gun movie. The HWOW included a link to a helpful website that provides the code names for all of the pilots in the latest Top Gun installment. If you fill in the code name for each pilot, the letters in the boxes spell out: ERIAPNLMOD

What could such nonsense mean? Clever hunters will quickly figure out that this is unscrambles into PALINDROME. But what do the Top Gun pilots and palindromes have in common? Well, don't forget about the quiet and unassuming pilot "Bob" in the new movie, whose code name is simply "Bob" the only code name that is also a palindrome. It's time to fire the afterburners and jet on over to:


If you are unable to locate Clue K, open emergency envelope 25, which will direct you to Clue L.

## This is Clue K. Solving this clue will lead you to Clue L.



The Treasure Hunt began in the north valley in 1951, long before many of today's highways and freeways even existed. The Valley sure has changed a lot since those early days. In many ways it is almost unrecognizable driving the surface streets. Many of us long term residents rely on landmarks and even utilize nicknames when giving driving directions.


## If you are unable to solve this clue, or to find Clue L, open emergency envelope 25 , which will direct you to Clue $L$.

## This is emergency solution 25 , which will lead you to Clue $L$.

Obviously the clue is a math problem with images of landmarks around the valley. Hunters who studied the HWOW found a link to a metro area road map. How do those images relate to highways or roads?

Starting from the top left the image is of Red Mountain, suggesting the Red Mountain Freeway (the 202). Then the Seal of the Salt River Pima Indian Tribe, hinting at the Pima Freeway (the 101). Followed by the Beeline Highway on its way to Payson (Highway 87). And last on the left is an image of the Superstition Mountains, suggesting the Superstition Freeway (Highway 60).

Uhura was played by actress Nichelle Nichols who passed away this year. Give Scotty a call and beam on over to NN, but don't forget to convert back to morse code first!

Strange. A red phone in the middle of the desert...but no dial tone. And it has a small display screen indicating that the phone is inactive.

The astute hunter will quickly realize that the phone can be activated using the plastic RFID card purchased at checkout. The card is marked with the HH logo in UV ink and a matching logo is printed on the phone in UV ink. The phone will ring and, if you answer, a representative from the not-so-prestigious law firm of Hunter \& Hass (A. Hunter and Jack Hass) will direct you to their advertisement in the Phoenix New Times. Hopefully you took the hint from the HWOW and picked up a copy on the way to checkout. If you hang up the phone and dial the phone number in the ad, you will get a pre-recorded message informing you, inter alia, that Mr. Hass comes from a long line of avocado farmers, and the screen will display an avocado. Looks like it's time to chase an ambulance over to:


If you are unable to locate Clue $\mathbf{O}$, open emergency envelope 13, which will direct you to Clue P.

Calculate the volume of ounces in each drink, insert those values into the formula, and arrive at a total of 9.0 ounces. A careful second reading of the recipes will reveal one nine-ounce cocktail: Irish Car Bomb. Sadly, this reminds us of the tragic car bombing assasination of AZ Republic reporter Don Bolles, as described in the article (link provided on HWOW). Don't drink and drive, and head to

If you are unable to locate Clue P, open emergency envelope 5, which will direct you to Clue Q .

This is a Visual Clue consisting of a human skeleton laying on the desert floor. He's wearing a pith helmet and the scene includes: binoculars, a local map, a compass, and a book entitled Exploring Deserts.


> If you are unable to solve this clue, or to find Clue $S$, open emergency envelope 21, which will direct you to Clue $S$.

Of course, this is not the only explorer to reach end of life in 2022. This scene should bring to mind the article in the Brown Bag regarding the recent demise of the once-heralded Microsoft Internet Explorer browser. As reported in the article, a gravestone was erected to celebrate its run from August 17, 1995 to June 15, 2022. So head on over to


If you are unable to locate Clue S, open emergency envelope 14, which will direct you to Clue T.

## This is Clue S. Solving this clue will lead you to Clue T.

As detectives with the Jackass City Police Department, you have been called to the home of a wealthy socialite who was murdered. The crime was committed on the previous evening by one of four dinner guests: Avery, Gil, Horatio, and Mac. Four uniformed officers, already looking for evidence at the scene, collected several pieces of reliable information.

- The first officer is certain that Horatio arrived to the dinner party before Gil and departed before Avery.
- The second officer is certain that Gil arrived to the dinner party before Avery, and departed before Mac.
- The third officer is certain that Mac arrived to the dinner party after Gil, but departed before Horatio.
- The fourth officer, who is a rookie at their first crime scene, excitedly tells you they discovered a key piece of information, but in their excitement has forgotten it. However, they assure you that they wrote it down in their department issued notebook that, unfortunately, has been misplaced.

Can you find the notebook and solve the murder?

> If you are unable to solve this clue, or to find Clue T, open emergency envelope 14, which will direct you to Clue T .

The departure clues tell us that the order of departure was Gil, Mac, Horatio, Avery. Then from the notepad clue, only Mac or Horatio could be the killer. However, the arrival clues give two possible scenarios, but in both Horatio arrived first, so he couldn't be the killer. That leaves Mac as the killer. The astute hunter will realize that all four names are the first names of the lead characters on the four different CSI shows. Mac Taylor is the lead on CSI:NY. Head to the New York symbol on the map.


> If you are unable to locate Clue T , open emergency envelope 15 , which will direct you to Clue $\mathbf{U}$.

## This is Clue T. Solving this clue will lead you to Clue U.

This is a visual clue consisting of a non-qwerty keyboard.


If you are unable to solve this clue, or to find Clue U, open emergency envelope 15 , which will direct you to Clue $U$.

This is emergency solution 15 , which will lead you to Clue U .

Hunters must "use" a strange keyboard to solve this clue. The brown bag contains a pencil with jumbled letters, too. Use the keyboard (mentally) as a decoder that maps to the correct QWERTY layout to reveal the secret message: AVOID WRONG KEYS. Returning to the keyboard, observant hunters will discover that three letters remain correctly mapped to the familiar QWERTY layout: U, F, and L. These letters can be rearranged in six ways, including FLU. Drink plenty of fluids, get some rest, and head to:


If you are unable to locate Clue $\mathbf{U}$, open emergency envelope 19, which will direct you to Clue V.

Hunters will arrive and see a partially completed wordle board, with one guess remaining. Some of the letters are colored in gold. What could be the answer to this puzzle?

Upon closer inspection, there are 8 letters that are colored gold, however only 5 of them are unique. In wordle the yellow (gold) letters indicate a correct letter, just in the wrong location. There are 5 unique golden letters I, W, E, H and T, but they are obviously not in the right spot. All the guesses so far have been colors.
Rearranging the golden letters comes up with another color: WHITE. Head over to the golden girl Betty White at:


If you are unable to locate Clue V, open emergency envelope 1, which will direct you to Clue W.

The hunters approach a Wizard directing traffic along two routes, one with red and the other with blue reflectors. They present each team with either 1 red flashlight or 1 blue flashlight to match their route.

They use the lights to shine into the surroundings and find a corresponding color out there in the desert... and off they go!

## If you are unable to solve this clue, or to find Clue W, open emergency envelope 1, which will direct you to Clue W.

A Hunt within a Hunt!! Each team of Hunters probably includes a Boy or Girl Scout or two, or at least a few folks who read the HWOW to learn how to Cat Eye Hunt. At each cat eye stop, there is a sign listing the plant species, but missing the common name. Using their Brown Bag inspired knowledge, the hunters identify the flora in front of them:

Saguaro (S), Creosote (C), Barrel (B), Mesquite (M), and an Ironwood (I) at the end of the 'trail.'

Looking at the map, Hunters will see a few combinations of these initials, but only the path they just followed will reveal the correct order, so go shine your light on:


If you are unable to locate Clue W, open emergency envelope 20, which will direct you to Clue X .

This is Clue W. Solving this clue will lead you to Clue X.


If you are unable to solve this clue, or to find Clue $X$, open emergency envelope 20, which will direct you to Clue X .

This is emergency solution 20, which will lead you to Clue $\mathbf{X}$.

The HWOW link that taught you how to play Codenames was Hg 7, or Mercury 7. Looking through the remaining unplayed words, these seven words tell the story of Phoenix Mercury star Brittney Griner's ordeal in Russia.


If you are unable to locate Clue $X$, open emergency envelope 9, which will direct you to Clue $Y$.

This is emergency solution 9, which will lead you to Clue Y .

As the HWOW warned, semaphores can indeed appear in the most abstract places. Clever Hunters will therefore notice that these animals are sending you a coded message. Using the semaphore chart helpfully provided in the Brown Bag, you should quickly discover that the animals are signalling the letters "D", "U", "N", "C" and "E". Are they calling you a dunce? No! They are pointing you toward:


If you are unable to locate Clue Y , open emergency envelope 4, which will direct you to Clue $Z$.

This is a working visual. At the site will be two identical star charts, similar to this:

Beginning in 1970, teams with less than three years of respite from committee service and teams with six years of committee service are offered the opportunity to declare their cars Professional. This declaration must be made upon application for tickets to the Hunt. In 1981, the 1970 resolution was amended to limit those teams wishing to declare themselves Professional to those having three or more qualifying members under the 1970 resolution.

The Treasure Hunt Committee employs the following interpretations of these resolutions:
Professional teams agree not to compete against amateur teams in the Hunt. First, second, and third place prizes will be awarded to the three amateur teams with the lowest times per clue. If a professional team has the lowest time per clue for the hunt, the team will be added to the "Pro Button Winners" section of the Hall of Fame. Those team members whose status qualified the team for professional competition will be awarded Pro Buttons to be affixed to their previously awarded red hats. Any Pro teams having times per clue better than the third place winners will be identified for their commendable performances, while those Pro teams that placed closer to the other end of the pack will also receive some "special" recognition.

Teams that are eligible to declare themselves Professional for the Hunt but do not do so, for whatever reason, will compete as amateur teams and will be eligible for the first, second and third place prizes.
