

This is Clue A. Solving this clue will lead you to Clue B.



For this Living Visual, some classic cars are parked next to each other, with the sign shown. Hunters will be invited to inspect the cars, but as they approach the Ford Galaxie 500, several Wizards, posing as "Security," will loudly prevent them from getting too near.



If you are unable to solve this clue, or to find Clue B, open emergency envelope 7, which will direct you to Clue A.

This is emergency solution 7, which will lead you to Clue B.

Boy, worst car show ever! Aren't you supposed to be able to, you know, check out ALL the cars without some "Security" jerks hassling you? It's like they're guards or something. Well, at least it's just that one car they care about, a Ford Galaxie 500. You might even say that they're Guardians of the Galaxie (or Galaxy). Hey, wasn't that a movie this summer? Oh yeah, it sure was. Go to circle at the intersection of Pratt Place and Diesel Drive.

is located in Map Grid [F, 15]. From the intersection of Union Hills and 16th street, proceed North 0.25 miles to Wescott Drive. Travel 300 feet and park on the East side of the street (park just South of the No parking sign). The clue-site will be 220 feet East of the road adjacent to the ball field underneath the large Mesquite tree.

This is Clue B. Solving this clue will lead you to Clue C.

If you are unable to solve this clue, or to find Clue C, open emergency envelope 15, which will direct you to Clue D.

This is emergency solution 15, which will lead you to Clue C.

Obviously this cryptogram is too short to solve by itself. A wise Hunter would notice the cryptogram on the HWOW which solves to:

THE ONLY THING THAT IS CONSTANT IS CHANGE. - HERACLITUS

That substitution code is the same as the one used here, which will allow you to easily change the letters of this clue to read:

GO TO THAT WHICH REMAINS UNCHANGED

Many things remain unchanged, but the thing to notice is that only the letter T remains unchanged from the ciphertext to plaintext, since the T represents itself. Thus, you should go to !



is located in Map Grid [H, 13]. From the intersection of Cave Creek Road and Deer Valley Road, proceed East on Deer Valley Road for 1.1 mile to 32nd Street. Turn left and proceed North on 32nd Street for 0.40 miles to the end of the pavement and park. Walk 420 feet North on the dirt road. The clue site will be on your left (West) 30 feet from the path on the chain link fence.

If you are unable to locate Clue C, open emergency envelope 23, which will direct you to ClueD.

Worldly Hunters would recognize these flags as the flags of the Netherlands, France, Croatia, Columbia and Russia. This should remind Hunters of the HWOW, "Which group is which?" and the flag-covered soccer ball that suggested you better know the different matchups of the group round in the World Cup. Matching each country with the group they were assigned spells out: B-E-A-C-H

So head on over to:





is located in Map Grid [K, 14]. From the intersection Deer Valley Road and Tatum Blvd, proceed South 0.8 miles to East Mayo Boulevard. Turn left and proceed East 0.8 miles on Mayo Boulevard. On the North side of the road is a large APS power substation. The clue-site is 60 feet Northeast from the Northeast corner of the rear wall of the APS substation in between three large mesquite trees.

If you are unable to locate Clue D, open emergency envelope 18, which will direct you to Clue E.

This is Clue D. Solving this clue will lead you to Clue E.

Hunters will find a large box and associated apparatuses consisting of:

- -door handle on a door slightly larger than a bowling ball
- -5 foot vertical high pvc pipe
- -10' long horizontal pvc pipe



If you are unable to solve this clue, or to find Clue E, open emergency envelope 18, which will direct you to Clue E.

What an interesting collection of items. Time to dust off the fishing pole, button magnet, ten foot pole, bowling ball and black light! At the bottom of the vertical pvc pipe are keys that can be removed by attaching a small magnet to the Brown Bag metal swivel and attaching the metal piece to the swivel on your fishing pole and lowering the magnet into the pipe with the fishing pole. You will retrieve a key which unlocks the door handle. Inside the door is an obvious place to put a bowling ball. However, the bowling ball just sits there until a 10' pole is inserted into the horizontal pvc pipe to release the bowling ball down the ramp. When the bowling ball rolls down the ramp, a flag is raised. At first glance, Hunters see a few Beatles related images, but nothing with a direct tie to the map. When Hunters remember to use the last item indicated on the HWOW, they will shine their black lights on the raised flag to find a picture of the Beatles drum. So clamor on over to:



is located in Map Grid [O, 15]. From the intersection of the 101 Freeway and Princess Drive/Pima Road, proceed Northeast on Pima Road 0.7 miles to Legacy Blvd. Turn left on Legacy Blvd. and proceed 0.2 miles to 88th Street. Turn right on 88th Street and proceed North 0.25 miles to a dirt road leading west and park on the West side of the road. The clue-site is 140 feet Northwest from the intersection of the dirt road and 88th street on the West side of a small Ironwood tree.

This is Clue E. Solving this clue will lead you to Clue F.

This is emergency solution 8, which will lead you to Clue F.

Most Hunters will recognize that this is a list of elements. Checking your periodic table (that the HWOW recommended you bring), you'll see that the symbols for these elements are W, H, O, W, As, He, I, Se, N, Be, and Rg, and when combined becomes "Who Was Heisenberg." Heisenberg was the clandestine alias of the fictional main character Walter White of the award winning AMC series Breaking Bad. Walter White was also known as WW, and since W is the periodic symbol for Tungsten, use whatever "Meth"od you can to get yourself over to:

is located in Map Grid [M, 14]. From the intersection of Thompson Peak Parkway and Hayden Road, proceed North on Hayden road for 1.0 miles to Deer Valley Road. Turn left on Deer Valley road and proceed west for 700 feet and park on the south side of the road. The clue-site is 680 feet south of Deer Valley Road located 40 feet from the Southeast corner of the power station beside a large mesquite tree.

This is Clue F. Solving this clue will lead you to Clue G.



Hunters will come to a table with Volkswagen Beetles crossing a road reminiscent of the cover of the final Beatles album, Abbey Road. A closer look will reveal that the white bug (which was missing in the HWOW) is missing the first two letters of its license plate.

If you are unable to solve this clue, or to find Clue G open emergency envelope 12, which will direct you to Clue G.

This is emergency solution 12, which will lead you to Clue G.

From the HWOW, Hunters should remember seeing the famous Beatles' album cover for Abbey Road, minus the white Volkswagen bug in the background. According to lore (aka "Google"), the license plate of the original VW bug was repeatedly stolen, and conspiracy theorists claimed the registration LMW 28IF was code for one of the "Paul is dead" messages. The white beetle at the clue site is missing the first two letters of its notorious license plate. Those '60s conspiracy theorists claimed that the "LMW" stood for "Linda McCartney weeps," but you don't need to cry for Paul (or John, George, or Ringo). Just drive your car, Baby, on over to:






is located in Map Grid [P, 12]. From the intersection of Pinnacle Peak Road and Pima Road, proceed East on Pinnacle Peak for 1.4 miles to Church Road. Turn Right on Church Road and travel 0.3 miles and park on the right. The clue-site is 70 feet Northwest next to a saguaro cactus with 6 arms.

This is Clue G. Solving this clue will lead you to Clue H.

These Angry Birds are working on balancing out their destructiveness. Each type of bird represents a different explosive strength, either 1, 2, 3, 4 or 5 pounds of TNT equivalent. Can you determine which bird packs what punch and balance the final scale for them?



If you are unable to solve this clue, or to find Clue H, open emergency envelope 17, which will direct you to Clue H.

This is emergency solution 17, which will lead you to Clue H.

Hunters who aren't mathematically inclined may feel like pigs being bombarded by Angry Birds with this clue, but those Hunters up to the Angry Bird challenge will find that a bit of substitution will put these birds in their place. After trial and error, you find that the female bird represents 1 pound, the yellow canary represents 2 pounds, the red cardinal represents 3 pounds, the toucan represents 4 pounds and the black time bomb represents 5 pounds. Thus, 4 pounds of TNT equivalent are required to balance the final scale.


Because you only find single birds within circles on the map, you can confidently fly over to circle Toucan.



is located in Map Grid [M, 12]. From the intersection of Pinnacle Peak Road and Scottsdale Road, proceed West on Pinnacle Peak for 0.5 miles to 68th Street (at the Mt. Sinai Cemetery sign). Turn right on 68th Street and travel North 0.5 miles and park just East of the Mt. Sinai cemetery gate entrance. The clue-site is 310 feet East-southeast of the road on the east side of a wash beside a large Palo Verde tree.

If you are unable to locate Clue H, open emergency envelope 4, which will direct you to Clue I.

This is Clue H. Solving this clue will lead you to Clue I.



If you are unable to solve this clue, or to find Clue I, open emergency envelope 4, which will direct you to Clue I.

This is emergency solution 4, which will lead you to Clue I.

A Bingo board in the middle of the desert – where are the crazies with their wacky bingo markers? When you mark (push) all of the numbers called out during checkout, you find that you get a Bingo and two things happen: 9.4605284×10^{15} meters lights up and a loud buzzer goes off. From your HWOW research, you will remember that 9.4605284×10^{15} meters is a light year. While recovering from the fright caused by the buzzer, you realize you can't find a light year on the map. However, once you realize that the buzzer may serve a purpose, you realize that Buzz and Lightyear may go together, indicating that the solution is our Toy Story friend, Buzz Lightyear. Bingo! Fly on over to circle



is located in Map Grid [K, 9]. From the intersection of Scottsdale Road and Dynamite Road, proceed West 2.0 miles to 56th Street. Turn left on 56th Street and travel South for 0.5 miles to Pinnacle Vista Drive. Turn right on Pinnacle Vista Drive and travel West 600 feet to the power line road. Turn right and travel Northwest 0.1 mile and park. The clue-site is 210 feet East of the road beside a Palo Verde tree.

This is Clue I. Solving this clue will lead you to Clue J.

Working Visual with bull's-eye targets, a "no sharks" sticker, and an LED display. Shining a laser at the targets will illuminate the letters S, A, U, C, and E.



If you are unable to solve this clue, or to find Clue J, open emergency envelope 9, which will direct you to Clue J.

This is emergency solution 9, which will lead you to Clue J.

The Laser Radiation warning should advise you that you'll need your laser pointer (mentioned on the HWOW) for this clue. Sure enough, shining the laser onto the targets makes letters illuminate. From left to right, the targets illuminate S, A, U, C, and E, or "SAUCE." The "No Sharks" and laser should remind you of the HWOW MuleTube clip from the Austin Powers movie, where Dr. Evil is lamenting their inability to get sharks with "freakin' laser beams." What they got in place of sharks were Sea Bass, and in the Brown Bag is a recipe for Grilled Sea Bass with Thai Sauce. Since the SAUCE is Thai, you'll need to head over to:




is located in Map Grid [H, 9]. From the intersection of Dynamite Blvd and Cave Creek Road, proceed South on Cave Creek 0.5 miles to Sonoran Desert Drive. Turn right on Sonoran Desert Drive and travel Northwest for 0.9 miles to the dirt road leading to the East. Turn right and follow the dirt road Northeast 0.1 mile and park. The clue-site is 90 feet Southeast of the road on the far side of the wash next to a Palo Verde tree.

If you are unable to locate Clue J, open emergency envelope 22, which will direct you to Clue K

Working Visual with a table top that has a sharpened dowel labeled "You are here" and three clear disks. Each disk has a "North" marker, a diameter marker, a center hole which fits nicely over the dowel, and another hole near the edge.



If you are unable to solve this clue, or to find Clue K, open emergency envelope 22, which will direct you to Clue K.

This is emergency solution 22, which will lead you to ClueK.

We have a large table with a dowel (labeled "You are here"), and 3 disks. Poking the dowel through your map lined up with your current position, and then placing the discs on the dowel, one will notice the disk cutouts align with map circles. If all three of the disks are used, the circles reveal P, I, and G. Now you might be tempted to head for Circle Pig, but that would take you to a Jackass. Instead, utilize the HWOW to select the "Tru-ly" proper diameter of 14.2 (which is on the TruEyes contact in the Brown Bag). Using just the disk labeled 14.2, circle G is revealed. is located in Map Grid [J, 7]. From the intersection of Lone Mountain Road and Cave Creek Road, proceed North on Cave Creek road 1.0 miles to Rancho Paloma Drive. Turn right on Rancho Paloma Drive and proceed East 0.2 miles and park on the right side just past the wash. The clue-site is 170 feet Southwest of the road on the south side of a Palo Verde tree.

This is Clue K. Solving this clue will lead you to Clue L.

Screen rapidly scrolling a message, one word at a time. Each letter is colored differently.

After racing out to a clue in the middle of the desert, many Hunters would be hoping to slow down for a bit. However, after seeing words scrolling rapidly on a screen, you realize that you are going to have to read awfully fast to understand the message. It may take a few times through, but you eventually are able to read the message to say "Read Fast, Decipher Code. To Solve Clue Drive Towards Circle Letters DEF. Drive Slowly. Carefully Buckle Seat Belt." Sounds easy – head to circle DEF, right? Well, as the HWOW pointed out, "All Hunters can read fast and find jackasses, but only successful Hunters can focus on black." Thus, as a successful Hunter you have realized that you must ignore the letters in other colors and only read the black letters. After spending some additional time reading the scrolling words, you are able to read the black letters only and get "G-O-T-O-C-I-R-C-L-E-R-O-C-K-E-T."

Beginning in 1970, all committee members with less than three years of respite from committee service and all committee members with six years of committee service are offered the opportunity to declare their cars Professional. This declaration must be made upon application for tickets to the Hunt. In 1981, the 1970 resolution was amended to limit those teams wishing to declare themselves Professional to those having three or more qualifying members under the 1970 resolution.


The Treasure Hunt Committee employs the following interpretations of these resolutions.

Professional teams agree not to compete against amateur teams in the Hunt. First, second, and third place prizes will be awarded to the three amateur teams with the lowest times per clue. If a professional team has the lowest time per clue for the hunt, the team will be added to the `Pro Button Winners` section of the Hall of Fame. Those team members whose status qualified the team for professional competition will be awarded Pro Buttons to be affixed to their previously awarded red hats. All Pro teams having times per clue better than the third place winners will be identified for their commendable performances, while those Pro teams that placed closer to the other end of the pack will also receive some `special` recognition.

Teams that are eligible to declare themselves Professional for the Hunt yet do not do so, for whatever reason, will compete as amateur teams and be eligible for the first, second and third place prizes.
